Calgary has been selected to host the **2008 World Paddle Championships**, beating out Sao Paolo, Brazil for the rights to this illustrious event. Taking place August 23–30, 2008, Calgary will become the first Canadian city to host an international "paddle" event of its kind.

Paddle (or "padel" as it is known in other parts around the world) is among the best-loved, mostwatched and most-commonly played sports in Latin America and many parts of Europe. With the last World Championships held in Spain and seen by millions of viewers around the globe, the world's



eyes will be focused on Calgary in 2008 for the next World Paddle Championships.

Boasting an unmatched volunteer spirit and rich history of hosting internationally-acclaimed, world-class events, including the 1988 Winter Olympics and the 1998 World Police Fire Games,

Calgary will play host to paddle's top men's and women's teams in August 2008. Competitors will be coming from at least 20 countries around the world, including Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Chile, France, Germany, Great Britain, Holland, India, Israel, Italy, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Paraguay, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Switzerland, Uruguay, USA, Venezuela and Canada.

Recognizing the rapidly growing popularity for the sport within Canada, the bid was supported by the Paddle Association of Canada (PAC), headquartered in Calgary, with sport event bid services from Tourism Calgary. "This is a real coup for Calgary," boasted Bill Stamile, President of PAC. "To host this world-class paddle event indicates the respect Canadians have for this sport. Hosting this event in Calgary will significantly increase the exposure of our sport in North America and greatly assist the Paddle Association of Canada in promoting the sport across Canada."

paddle explained

For those unfamiliar with the discipline, **paddle (or pádel)** is a fast and exciting racquet sport combining elements of tennis and squash into a fun and skillful game for all ages. Paddle is played by millions of people in many countries around the world and features professional tours in Argentina and Spain. Created in Mexico in the early 1970s, and popularized in Spain and Argentina soon thereafter, this relatively new sport is quickly becoming one of Canada's most popular racquet games, gaining rapid acceptance due to its simplicity and similarities to other popular racquet sports.



Put simply, paddle is much like a scaled down version of tennis and squash using a slightly smaller court (with walls) and graphite paddles instead of stringed racquets. The court is one third the size of a tennis court and is surrounded by 10' high walls of glass and/or solid construction. It has been


described as a "squash court in the sun" and "a tennis court with walls", though the flow and energy of the game is completely unique and exciting. Scoring is similar to tennis and the same ball and net is used, but the game requires players to use an underhand serve and it is always played as a doubles game.

The Racket is solid being made mostly from light composite materials. The surface is perforated to lighten the racket and to allow for airflow. The face of the racket is relatively large measuring 26 cm x 29 cm (10 inch x 12 inch) and the overall length is

45 cm (18 inch). The short racket is much easier to control than a longer stringed racket. In this way from the first time on court, novices of all ages and racket skills can enjoy a well-paced game with plenty of rallies.

The Game of paddle is always a doubles game using mainly tennis rules and scoring, with some key adaptations such as an underhand serve. The game is played in an enclosed structure and the rules allow for the use of the back wall and sidewalls resulting in longer rallies.

The Court is rectangular in shape with a dimension of 10m wide by 20m long and is divided in the middle by a net. At the end of each court there is a half box shaped wall consisting of 10m wide back wall with two side walls of 4m extending along the sidelines. The height of the back wall and sidewalls is 3m. The balance of the court is enclosed with mesh wire that is also 3m high. Three paddle courts can be placed in the same surface area as one tennis court.
